For five days from October 12th (Monday) to 16th (Friday), PCR tests for COVID-19 were open to all students and faculty members of our university.

A total of 1668 students (20% of the total student body) and 725 faculty members (32% of the total faculty, 55% of full-time faculty) received the examination and all tested negative.
